Phonics compulsory for every student

All Year 1 students will be required to undergo a compulsory phonics check from next year.

The teaching of reading using phonics will be a compulsory part of the classroom from 2021 onwards.

Minister for Education Sarah Mitchell said the evidence of phonics effectiveness is undeniable, and from 2021 all Year 1 NSW public school students will undergo a compulsory phonics check.

"The evidence speaks for itself. The best results in reading for our students occurs when phonics is explicitly and systematically taught in Year 1 before moving on to other forms of reading instruction," Ms Mitchell said.

"We are building a curriculum and an education system that focuses on strong foundations using best practice.

"Using phonics to build strong reading foundations in the early years of school opens doors to success later in life."

This year 520 NSW government primary schools joined a trial of the Phonics screening check with 23,975 Year 1 students participating.

The results of the trial were immediately available to teachers and aligned with the NSW English syllabus, allowing them to identify gaps in their students' reading ability quickly.

In addition to the instant results, teachers received online professional development to deliver effective reading instruction to students.

Ms Mitchell said that 98 per cent of teachers who were part of the trial found the information the Phonics Screening Check provided about students' knowledge was beneficial and had an impact on their classroom practice.

"More than 95 per cent of teachers also said that they benefitted from the professional learning and resources to assist them in implementing the assessment, analysing the results and planning for what to do next in the classroom," Ms Mitchell said.

"Tools like the phonics check are providing teachers with the data they need to provide targeted support to students who need it most."

"Because phonics is an efficient tool to teach reading, and the check is an effective way to identify gaps, schools will also be set phonics check targets.

"We are ambitious for our schools and have a responsibility to deliver the best education to our students in a way that we know is the most effective.

"A phonics target means that the ability to teach reading successfully becomes a measurable responsibility for our teachers and principals.

"This is an exciting time for education in NSW. We are implementing initiatives that are world leading and that have been created using the best evidence."

As you are aware, Gloucester Public School is well placed for the phonics check in 2021. Our school asked to be included in the phonics check trial in 2020 and our students placed extremely well.

Our evidenced-based phonics program for effective literacy instruction is effective because it is grounded in scientific evidence-based best practice.

At Gloucester Public School we use InitiaLit (InitiaLit F for Kindergarten, InitiaLit 1 for Year 1 and InitiaLit 2 for Year 2) which is an evidence-based whole class literacy program, providing all students with the essential core knowledge and strong foundation to become successful readers and writers.

InitiaLit is a 3-year program, covering Kindergarten, Yr 1 and Yr 2.

We will continue to use InitiaLit, MiniLit, MacqLit and MultiLit programs at Gloucester Public School as we plan for the next 4-year cycle - School Improvement Plan 2021 – 2024.

Building deep emotional connections with kids



Imagine your child comes to you upset that a sibling or friend has cheated in a game. There are a number of ways to respond, including telling them not to worry ("Let it go!"), advising them how to handle it ("Next time you keep the score.") or empathising emotionally ("You must feel disappointed.")

Each is a legitimate response for a parent and teacher to make, but only the latter builds a deep emotional connection. Importantly, the empathetic response builds a child's or young person's emotional intelligence as it taps into their ability to recognise current feelings.

How emotional connection works

Kids crave to be understood by others, especially by the people they love or respect. When you accurately feed back how a child or young person is feeling you demonstrate that you really care. Strong relationships are formed on the bedrock of care, kindness and compassion.

How to give emotional feedback that connects

Giving accurate emotional feedback to an upset child or teenager takes practice. It requires that you pay attention, move into the present moment, listen to a child and identify the feeling behind their words. High or loud emotions such as anger, annoyance and panic are often easier to identify than low or muted emotions such as worry, discouragement or loneliness.

An effective way to connect on emotional level is to listen to what a child has to say, and then think back to a time you were in a similar situation. Imagine if a child says they feel horrible because their friends laughed at them when they made mistake in class. Rather than respond immediately, think back to a time when you made a mistake in front of others and identify how you felt. Embarrassed, ashamed, or annoyed? "I bet that you felt embarrassed and annoyed when your friends laughed at you." Your child may tell you that you're off the mark, but they'll more than likely appreciate the empathy you show.

Feed back the positive emotions too

You don't have to wait until something challenging happens to connect with a child on an emotional level. Accurately mirror positive feelings such as relief (after a stressful situation has passed), enthusiasm (as they begin something they love doing) and chilled (as they put their feet up at the end of the day). We all experience many emotions throughout the day. The ability to accurately recognise and feed back the emotions of children and young people is a wonderful way to build connections of quality and depth.

Good for Kids good for life

KEEP THE LUNCHBOX COOL

As the weather warms up it is important to keep the lunchbox cool so that food stays safe to eat.

Using an insulated lunchbox with an ice brick can keep the lunchbox 12° cooler.

You could also try a frozen:

- Water bottle
- Milk popper
- **◆** Yoghurt

These double as a refreshing drink or cool snack as they defrost.
